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## Day Five - Why Vote

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Much doubt has been cast on the most fundamental building block of our democracy—the vote. Despite what some may want you to believe, voting in our nation remains safe and secure, with instances of intentional fraud truly rare. Even today, voting is the most direct way we have to connect with the people who represent us. It is important to join together with neighbors and friends to push this great democratic experiment forward for one more year, especially when accessing the right to vote continues to be a challenge for many. On this final day, let’s take some time to reflect on the value of the hard-fought right to vote and how we can help improve the process so that more voices can be heard.

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## Choose One of Today's Challenges

**#1: Before we go any further. Are you registered to vote? Are you sure?**

**#2: Stacey Abrams was the first Black woman nominated for a governor's office in America. She lost her race by fewer than 50,000 votes in a highly contested recount. She has a [few thoughts](#) on why you should vote even if it feels inadequate.**

**#3: This year in Ohio we will vote for a number of judges including for the State Supreme Court. [In a recent study conducted by the Bliss Institute at University of Akron](#) only about half of respondents said that they always vote for judges.**
